Jesus's Promise

"Blessed are the merciful, for they will be shown mercy." Matthew 5:7 (NIV, 2011)

1. Who Has the Right?

"My people, remember what Balak king of Moab plotted and what Balaam son of Beor answered." Micah 6:5a (NIV, 2011); compare Numbers 22-24

2. Who Is Right?

"Remember your journey from Shittim to Gilgal, that you may know the righteous acts of the LORD." Micah 6:5b (NIV, 2011); compare Numbers 25; Joshua 2-5

3. Who Does Right?

"With what shall I come before the LORD and bow down before the exalted God? Shall I come before him with burnt offerings, with calves a year old? Will the LORD be pleased with thousands of rams, with ten thousand rivers of olive oil? Shall I offer my firstborn for my transgression, the fruit of my body for the sin of my soul?"

Micah 6:6-7 (NIV, 2011)

"He has shown you, O mortal, what is good. And what does the LORD require of you?

To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God."
